Beckham, Stephen Dow. *Oregon Indians: Voices from Two Centuries* (2006). This volume has overview essays on changing federal Indian policies and lifts up the first-person accounts of numerous Native Americans across Oregon who speak about their own history.

Byers, Bruce. The View from Cascade Head: Lessons for the Biosphere from the Oregon Coast (2020).

These essays cover the development and management of over the past 90 years of the Cascade Head Experimental Forest and the Cascade Head Natural Area at the mouth of the Salmon River.

McKelvey, Susan Delano. Botanical Exploration of the Trans-Mississippi West, 1790-1850 (1991).

This history of 1,144 pages (4.6 pounds of book) recounts the work of early naturalists who explored and documented the homeland of Native Americans at the time of Euro-American contact and settlement.

Robbins, William. Landscape of Promise: The Oregon Story, 1800-1940 (1997). The essays are an overview of the development of Oregon and its natural resources.

----. Landscapes of Conflict: The Oregon Story, 1940-2000 (2004). The essays examine Oregon's embrace of statewide land-use planning and the impacts of federal environmental mandates in a state where more than 53% of the lands are public lands (forests, parks, wildlife refuges, and BLM holdings).

Rush, Elizabeth. *Rising: Dispatches from the New American Shore* (2018). While the essays extend from coast to coast, Rush presents a fascinating chapter on the H. J. Andrews Experimental Forest in the Western Cascades and its longitudinal environmental studies that span nearly a century.

Toedtemeier, Terry and John Laursen. Wild Beauty: Photographs of the Columbia River Gorge, 1867-1957 (2008).

This is a volume of stunning photographs documenting the historic landscapes of the Columbia Gorge and changes over a century.
